Northland School Parent Survey – 2021, 2022, 2023



Survey and focus group feedback -

Thank you for the parents who came and participated in the focus groups. The community consultation has been invaluable and we will incorporate into the shaping up of next year's annual plan.

Parents appreciate the school's overall performance, recognizing the inherent challenge of meeting every aspect of a child's learning. They commend the positive learning environment, engaging activities, and learning outcomes. Parents advocate for a clearer focus on supporting children with learning difficulties and stress the importance of enhanced two-way communication between teachers and families regarding a child's learning needs.

Parents advocate for a holistic approach to education, emphasizing the importance of fostering self-independence and responsibility in students. Parents stress the need for frequent progress measurement and reporting, active engagement in children's performance, and the incorporation of learning elements from the classroom into home through structured homework. Parents also support the idea of allowing children to try and fail as a means of building resilience and testing their limitations.

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Survey and focus group feedback -

Parents appreciate the school's commendable effort to involve the community in the learning process, making them feel valued. They praise the daily spontaneous communication and the accessibility of teachers for discussions, emphasizing the open-door policy.

Parents emphasize the importance of open and direct requests for engagement and support, advocating for collaboration and mutual support within the school community. Parents express appreciation for communications about their children's progress, enjoying snapshots of learning, and suggest extending similar opportunities to the children. They also value communications about the overall learning environment, encouraging parent support within the classroom and seeking individualized communications about each child's progress.

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Survey, whānau hui and focus group feedback -

Parents acknowledge the school's commendable efforts and express a need for increased learning support, recognizing the hard work of teachers. They emphasize the importance of continuing to build confident learners and commend the effective use of tools like the zones of regulation and conflict resolution, particularly appreciating the Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) approach. Parents value the weekly focus on values and strategies for emotional regulation. Parents expressed more diverse ways to celebrate success and achievements. Additionally, they seek more support for fostering friendships, teaching social skills, and encouraging self-awareness. Parents advocate for a stronger emphasis on physical activity, including more sports in the curriculum, and call for continued provision of pastoral care to teach children better ways to manage challenging behaviour.

Parents who provided the whanau hui feedback felt the school has made significant effort's in enhancing its incorporation of tikanga Māori through various initiatives such as pōwhiri and kapa haka. A particularly noteworthy achievement is the universal ability of all students to confidently recite karakia and whakatauki. Moreover, there has been a notable increase in the use of te reo Māori among both students and teachers, contributing to the normalization of the language and cultural practices within the school environment which also appears to be extending beyond the school premises, with positive aspects of te reo and tikanga filtering through to students' homes.

Parents feedback that the school has embraced the integration of te ao Māori into various aspects of the curriculum, shaping not only what is taught but also how it is taught across different subjects. A key focus lies in fostering a sense of identity, encouraging all children, irrespective of their cultural background. Furthermore, the concept of being kaitiaki, or guardians of nature, is emphasized, instilling a profound connection with the environment among students.
